# **Four Ways Gethsemane Shocks Us**

- 1. A shock to our doubts
- 2. A shock to our theology
- 3. A shock to our desires
- 4. A shock to our shame

It shocks to our doubts because it shows the reality of the weight of what was in front of Jesus. It is not a story of legend instead, it shows the humanity of that moment.

Think of a moment when something embarrassing happened, and the person who shared the story with you was gladly willing to tell it.

#### Question:

If you were going to compose a legendary story about yourself, what kinds of things would you share to make people think well of you?

The garden shocks our theology because why would Jesus have doubts and fear if he needed to pray to God?
Christians believe that Jesus was both fully God and fully human.

### Question:

Where would human nature and divine nature help to explain this shock?

The garden shocks our desires because Jesus denies his desires to honor the desires of God.

#### Question:

Why is it difficult to allow external authority to override our desires as people?

Read: Galatians 5:16-17

The garden shocks to shame because Jesus lays down his own desires to follow God.
